

Catch Up Premium 2018/19

What is the Catch-Up Premium?

The Catch-Up Premium was introduced in January 2013 and has since provided our school with additional funding for each Year 7 student who did not achieve the 'expected standard' in grammar, spelling, reading and/or mathematics at the end of Key Stage 2 (KS2). This funding has always been used to provide Literacy and Numeracy catch-up support for underachieving students in Year 7, in order that they are given the opportunity to "catch-up" as quickly as possible.

Schools can make their own decisions about how the grant is best used in the context of their existing strategies to help underperforming students to catch-up. In 2018 to 2019, schools will receive the same overall amount of Year 7 Catch-Up Premium funding they received in 2017 to 2018; we expect the funding to be in the order of £10,000 in funding and this is what is being budgeted for. We can now confirm the actual funding received was £10,536.

Use of the Catch-Up Premium 2018-2019

At the end of Key Stage 2, children are summatively assessed in both English and Maths; it is expected that children reach a scaled score of 100 or more to have 'met the expected standard' for a child transitioning to secondary school. In our 2018-19 Year 7 cohort:

- 19 Students did not meet the required standard in Reading, SPAG and Maths
- 36 Students did not meet the required standard in Reading
- 35 students did not meet the required standard in SPAG
- 41 students did not meet the required standard in Maths

Following detailed Question Level Analysis of the KS2 SATs materials and in conjunction with MIDYIS and Lucid testing, we were able to design an intervention package, based on individual student needs, which would best aid their transition to KS3. This included:

- Literacy Progress Unit focus groups
- Specific Learning Difficulty focus groups
- Numeracy Catch Up small-group work
- Literacy Catch Up small-group work
- Nurture groups – added provision focussing on Literacy and Numeracy.
- 1:1 English as an Additional Language programme

How will impact be measured?

Using the students' KS2 data as a baseline, at the end of the Spring term we will use KS2 test materials to collect comparable data. Raw scores and scaled scores will then be compared to gauge a like-for-like picture of how the students have progressed throughout the term. These assessments will be in addition to the formal assessments sat by all students in Year 7 throughout the year. This data will supply a comprehensive picture of the students' progress and help inform future needs. The attainment and progress of the Year 7 Catch-Up students will be reported to the Head teacher, senior management and school governors.
